CONFRONTING THE RISING COST OF HEALTHCARE

To truly lower costs and achieve better outcomes for every patient, all healthcare stakeholders must be held accountable for the rising cost of care.

> IMPROVING ACCESS TO QUALITY HEALTHCARE AMONG VULNERABLE POPULATIONS

Despite historic gains in recent years, more needs to be done to reduce the coverage gap among diverse communities and ensure access to treatments and services that meet the needs of all patients.

> SUPPORTING BREAKTHROUGH MEDICAL **TECHNOLOGIES AND INNOVATION**

We encourage the research and development of medical treatments to improve health outcomes and combat diseases that disproportionately affect diverse communities.

> IMPROVING ACCESS TO ADDICTION CARE AND **SAFE MEDICINES**

The number of overdoses and deaths due to the opioid epidemic and counterfeit medicines are growing. Access to safe medicines, education, and addiction care services is crucial.

Social determinants influence an individual's health. Health disparities based on these factors are a pervasive problem in the United States, resulting in higher mortality rates, chronic conditions, and infectious diseases.

RESEARCH

IDENTIFY HEALTH DISPARITIES AND OPPORTUNITIES FOR REFORM

Currently, minorities and vulnerable populations suffer from significantly poorer health outcomes as illustrated by examples below.

- * African Americans are 60% more likely to develop diabetes and have a 50% higher infant mortality rate than non-Hispanic whites.
- ₩ Hispanic children are 2x as likely to die from asthma than hon-Hispanic white children.
- Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders are 30% more likely to be diagnosed with cancer compared to no-Hispanic whites.
- More than 56% of LGBTQ individuals have confronted discrimination and refusal of care while seeking treatment from a healthcare provider.
- * Adults with disabilities are 3x more likely to suffer from a stroke, heart disease, diabetes, or cancer than adults without disabilities.
